The Board of Election Supervisors held its regular monthly meeting at the office on Aug. 30, 1967 at 3:30 P.M.

The minutes were read and approved.

Under old business, the Board discussed the possibility of changing the voting place from Leitersburg School to the Leitersburg Grange Hall. Mr. McCauley will check on the availability and cost of the Grange Hall, if the decision to change the voting place becomes necessary, due to the closing of the School or because of complaints from Spring Valley residents who do not want to go to Leitersburg to vote.

The Board discussed the correcting of voters of Dist. 2 that should be in Dist. 23. The Board suggested we go up to Pinesburg and try to secure the names of those that are in the wrong district and send them transfers to sign and return.

Mr. McCauley read a notice that all employers must give their employees two hours off with pay. New law has this stated in it and also that a receipt has to be printed to be given each one that requests it.

Discussed the Association meeting that is to be held at the Holiday Inn at Bowie, Md. on Sept. 21 and 22. It was decided that Mary and Dot will go for the full session and the Board Members will probably go to the Thursday afternoon session.

The minutes of the Association meeting that was held in Baltimore on Aug. 10, 1967 were read and discussed. This meeting was held prior to the hearing to discuss the establishing of a State Office of Election Law Administration. After much discussion at the Association meeting the proposal was that the Association recommend a five member bi-partisan Board, of which four members would be part-time and one member would be the full-time administrator of the state-wide election laws and they would be appointed for four year staggered terms. The Association would also like the privilege of recommending not more than 15 names to be considered by the Governor as his appointments to the five member bi-partisan State-wide Election Board. Washington County want on record as being opposed to the creating of this Office.

Mr. Long moved we adjourn and seconded by Mr. McCauley.

Pros And Cons Of State Bureau Aired At Meeting

Persons supporting the proposed creation of a State office to administer election laws said yesterday that such an office could provide needed uniformity, and eliminate much confusion of election matters.

Opponents of the proposal maintained that a State office would be too costly to taxpayers, and would remove authority from local election boards.

Views on the proposal were exchanged at a hearing held at the State Office Building by the subcommittee of the Elections Committee of the Legislative Council. Presiding over the hearing was Senator Steny H. Hoyer (D., Prince Georges), chairman of the subcommittee.
