- Pay attention to the non-verbal language of people who have a different cultural background. Also, be aware that others may not understand your own "body language."
- Speak slowly. Allow pauses, and do not talk too much.
- Organize your thoughts. Be specific, and explain things in

- Do not embarrass the person when checking to see if they understand.
- Listen carefully and patiently.
- Write things down as well as talking. If English is a person's second language, it may be easier to read English than to hear it

Super Bowl LVIII

Football has been a part of American history since 1869, but it wasn't until 1967 that the first Super Bowl trophy was awarded. The National Football League (NFL) commissioned Tiffany & Co. to design the "World Professional Football Championship Trophy." The winner of the Championship game, signifying the one team that would prove to be the most successful at overcoming all the long days battling a rough sport in the heat, rain, or snow could raise up a trophy just as impressive as the game itself.

In 1967, The Green Bay Packers led by head coach Vince Lombardi, defeated the Kansas City Chiefs to be awarded the first ever World Professional Football Championship Trophy. The media had dubbed the contentious and volatile contest between the long standing NFL and the nearly newly minted AFL (American Football League) the

"Super Bowl." Just one year later, the Green Bay Packers were to defeat Oakland in the Championship game and raise the trophy again! Vince Lombardi had led his team to victory 5 times in the span of 7 years and become widely considered one of the greatest coaches in the history of American sports. His coaching style and ethics had created a culture in American sports that centered around working harder than everyone else; second place was not considered an option for a player on a Vince Lombardi team. His legacy was quickly becoming synonymous with greatness in the sport.

Too soon, and after so many victories on the field, Lombardi found himself facing a battle with cancer. Vince Lombardi succumbed to cancer in late 1970 at the age of 57.

It was no surprise that the World Professional Football Championship Trophy was then renamed the "Vince Lombardi Trophy" to honor the man and the legacy that Lombardi had left on the American sports world. The Vince Lombardi trophy made of sterling silver and standing at just 22 inches high is one of the most coveted prizes in American sports today.

On January 17, 1971, the winners of Super Bowl V held high, for the first time, the now aptly named Vince Lombardi Trophy! And wouldn't you know it, that team was the Baltimore Colts! Baltimore would go through some growing changes over the years and would not hold the trophy again until 2001!
